The population of this study comprises parents and teachers in private pre primary schools in Oredo Local Government Area, Benin city, Edo State.

Sample and Sampling Techniques

From the population above, sixty (60) parents and forty (40) teachers were selected and sampled using Purposive sampling technique, based on the availability of parents and their willingness to cooperate with the researcher. A total of six (6) parents and four (4) teachers from ten (10) different schools were used in the study.

Research Instrument

The research instrument used for this research is a questionnaire titled "parent-teacher collaboration in early childhood education". The questionnaire comprises two sections, section A and B. The first part, Section A, focused on collecting basic information about the respondents' bio data like their age, gender, and sex. This helps the researcher understand who is taking part in the study. The second part, Section B, contains twenty different questions, aimed to further understand the topic and how parents and teachers work together in the early education of children. These questions were carefully crafted to gather insights, opinions, and experiences from the participants regarding this important aspect of early childhood education.

Validity of the Instrument

To ensure the questionnaire was valid, the research supervisor checked that the questions aligned with the research goals, covered the right topics, and used clear

language. The supervisor made all the necessary adjustments before the questionnaire was used in the study.

Reliability of the Study

The researcher checked how well the questions in the questionnaire were related by using a technique called internal consistency. Twenty copies of the questionnaire were given out to parents or guardians who weren't part of the main study to test its reliability. By using Cronbach Alpha statistic, they determined that the Alpha value was 0.90 showing that the questionnaire had a strong level of internal consistency.

Method of Data Collection:

The researcher personally handed out the questionnaire to the respondents, who filled it out and returned it after some time. This approach helped ensure a high response rate.

Method of Data Analysis

Presentation of data was done using tables while analysis was done using mean and standard deviation. The questionnaire was a four point likert scale. It was scored using the formula:

Strongly Agree (SA), 4 points

Agree (A) 3 points

Strongly Disagree (SD) 2 points

Disagree (D) 1 point

Therefore, mean responses that were up to 2.5 and above were regarded as accepted while responses that were less than 2.5 were considered as rejected.

CHAPTER FOUR

DATA ANALYSIS, INTERPRETATION AND DISCUSSION OF FINDINGS

Research Question One

How do parents and teachers perceive the dynamics of collaboration in early childhood education?

Research Question Two

This sentiment underscores the importance of collaboration between parents and teachers in shaping a child's educational journey. Similarly, in their seminal work "Beyond the Bake Sale," Anne T. Henderson and Karen L. Mapp emphasize the transformative potential of strong home-school partnerships, highlighting the positive impact on student achievement when parents and teachers work together.

Examining communication patterns and gaps between parents and teachers, especially in the context of technological advancements, reveals both opportunities and challenges. As Steve Jobs aptly noted, "Technology is nothing. What's important is that you have a faith in people, that they're basically good and smart, and if you give them tools, they'll do wonderful things with them." This insight speaks to the potential of technology to enhance communication between parents and teachers, bridging gaps and fostering collaboration. Conversely, as outlined in "The Digital Disconnect" by Larry D. Rosen, the overreliance on technology can also lead to communication breakdowns and hinder meaningful parent-teacher interactions.

The influence of diverse family structures and socioeconomic factors on collaboration between parents and teachers cannot be understated. Maya Angelou once

remarked, "We are more alike, my friends, than we are unlike." This resonates deeply in the context of early childhood education, emphasizing the need for inclusive approaches that acknowledge and celebrate diversity. Furthermore, research such as that conducted by Pamela E. on socioeconomic disparities in parental involvement underscores the importance of addressing systemic inequalities to promote effective collaboration in education.

Assessing the extent to which collaborative efforts between parents and teachers align with educational goals illuminates the foundation of successful early childhood education. As John Dewey famously stated, "Education is not preparation for life; education is life itself." This philosophy underscores the symbiotic relationship between collaborative partnerships and achieving educational objectives. Moreover, findings from studies such as "Parental Involvement and Academic Success" by Jeynes H. reinforce the correlation between parental involvement and student achievement, highlighting the pivotal role of collaboration in realizing educational goals.

CHAPTER FIVE

SUMMARY, CONCLUSION AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Summary of the Study

The study, sought to examine the significance of parent-teacher collaboration in early childhood education, emphasizing its essential role in fostering optimal developmental environments for young children. Early childhood is a critical period for human development, during which the family plays a pivotal role in shaping a child's educational and socio-emotional trajectory. Historically, parent-teacher interactions were limited to periodic meetings and report cards. However, contemporary educational paradigms demand a more dynamic and continuous partnership, acknowledging the significant influence that both home and school environments have on a child's growth.

Despite the acknowledged benefits of parent-teacher collaboration, several challenges persist. Effective communication between parents and teachers is often hindered by barriers such as cultural differences, language issues, and misconceptions. The integration of technology as a means of communication offers potential solutions but also presents its own set of challenges. In an era where digital platforms are increasingly prevalent, understanding how technology can facilitate or hinder communication is vital.

The study employs a survey research design to gather insights from 100 participants, comprising 60 parents and 40 teachers from private pre-primary schools in Oredo Local Government Area, Benin City, Edo State. The research instrument, a questionnaire titled "Parent-Teacher Collaboration in Early Childhood Education," collects demographic data and explores various aspects of parent-teacher collaboration. The validity and reliability of the questionnaire were rigorously tested, ensuring that the data collected was both relevant and consistent.

Data analysis reveals that parents and teachers generally perceive their collaboration as effective in supporting pupil success. They agree that working together creates a supportive learning environment and helps in identifying children's needs through regular communication and meetings. However, gaps remain, particularly in the frequency and effectiveness of communication facilitated by technology. Language barriers and varying levels of technological proficiency among parents and teachers were identified as significant obstacles.

The study also examines the impact of diverse family structures and socioeconomic factors on parent-teacher collaboration. Findings suggest that schools need to be sensitive to different family structures and provide cultural competence training for teachers. Consistency in collaboration across different socioeconomic backgrounds is crucial for fostering an inclusive educational environment. Schools must develop strategies that accommodate varied family compositions and address disparities in access to educational resources.

The alignment of collaborative efforts with educational goals is another critical aspect explored in the study. The research emphasizes the importance of inclusivity, aligning home-based activities with classroom curricula, and fostering mutual trust between parents and teachers. Effective collaboration should aim to support the child's overall learning and development, ensuring that educational goals are met.

Conclusion

The project underscores the significant role of parent-teacher collaboration in early childhood education. By addressing communication barriers, leveraging technology, and fostering cultural sensitivity, schools can create effective partnerships that support children's holistic development. Ongoing dialogue, mutual respect, and shared decision-making are key to ensuring that every child receives the support they need to thrive. Through targeted strategies and a culture of partnership, schools can create nurturing environments that promote academic success, social-emotional growth, and overall well-being for young learners.

This comprehensive exploration of parent-teacher collaboration in early childhood education provides valuable insights and practical strategies for enhancing collaborative efforts, ultimately benefiting the youngest learners in their formative years.

Recommendations

Based on the findings and analysis of this research on parent-teacher collaboration in early childhood education, several recommendations are proposed to enhance the effectiveness of these collaborative efforts:

- Schools should invest in and utilize multiple communication platforms to ensure frequent and effective communication between parents and teachers. This includes traditional methods such as phone calls and face-to-face meetings, as well as digital platforms like emails, school portals, and instant messaging apps. Implement regular updates and feedback systems to keep parents informed about their child's progress and school activities.
- Provide cultural competence training for teachers to better understand and respect the diverse backgrounds of families. This can help in bridging cultural gaps and fostering a more inclusive environment.
- Schools should create materials and resources in multiple languages and ensure translation services are available for parents who are not proficient in the primary language used at the school.
- Encourage the use of educational technology tools that facilitate parent-teacher communication and collaboration. For instance, apps that allow parents to track their child's progress, receive notifications about school events, and communicate with teachers.

- Conduct training sessions for parents and teachers to effectively use these technological tools to maximize their potential benefits.
- Develop and implement school policies that actively promote and support parental involvement. This includes flexible meeting times to accommodate parents' schedules and providing opportunities for parents to participate in school activities and decision-making processes.
- Ensure that school policies are inclusive and considerate of diverse family structures and socioeconomic backgrounds, offering support where necessary to engage all families equally.
- Schedule regular parent-teacher conferences to discuss the child's development, address concerns, and set goals collaboratively. This should be done at least twice a year, with additional meetings as needed.
- Organize workshops and training sessions for parents to help them understand their role in their child's education and provide them with strategies to support learning at home.
- Identify and provide additional support for families from lower socioeconomic backgrounds to ensure they have equal opportunities to participate in their child's education. This might include providing resources like internet access, learning materials, and transportation assistance.

- Create programs that specifically address the needs and challenges faced by these families, ensuring their active involvement in the school community.
- Establish a system for the continuous evaluation of parent-teacher collaboration efforts. This includes soliciting feedback from both parents and teachers on the effectiveness of communication strategies and collaboration initiatives.
- Use this feedback to make necessary adjustments and improvements, ensuring that the strategies remain effective and relevant to the needs of the school community.

By implementing these recommendations, schools can foster a more effective and inclusive environment for parent-teacher collaboration, ultimately enhancing the educational experiences and outcomes for young children.
